The next meeting will be held on Tuesday, December 3, at the Harvard Club of Boston. There will be a dinner at 6.45 o'clock, followed by the meeting at 8.15 p.m.

Mr. Henry S. Hall, Jr., and Mr. Bradford Washburn will show two motion pictures of exceptional interest. The first — "The Ascent of Mt Logan," was taken by the Mt. Logan Expedition of 1925 of which Mr. Hall was a member. Mt. Logan, 19,850 feet, is second only to Mt. McKinley in North America and carries the largest glaciers in the world outside of Greenland and the Antarctic. This expedition is generally recognized as the most important mountaineering effort, except Everest, since the war.

The second — "The Ascent of the Grépon," was made by Mr. Washburn last summer. This spectacular rock peak at Chamonix was first climbed in 1881 by the English climber Mummery. Mr. Washburn and his brother spent six weeks taking this picture. The crucial points of this rock climb and an excellent idea of this sort of work in the Alps is well shown by this unusual film.

Mr. Coolidge was leader of the Indo-China division of the recent Roosevelt Expedition of the Field Museum. The party consisted of four scientists, three of them Harvard men (Coolidge, Van Tyne and Wheeler).

They did original scientific work in this remote mountainous region and travelled over a thousand miles down the Me-Kong and its tributaries in dugout canoes.

The talk will be illustrated by slides and motion pictures.
