

CHAPTER XXXIII

WORLD WAR

That the people of Jaffrey, in common with millions of other American citizens, hoped that the United States might be spared the necessity of becoming involved in the holocaust which engulfed most of the civilized world in the years following 1914, but realized that the dignity of the nation could not brook unprovoked attacks upon its citizens is shown by the resolution adopted by the annual town meeting held on March 13, 1917.

The citizens of Jaffrey in town meeting assembled hereby affirm their loyal adherence to all the principles of freedom fundamental to the existence of the United States. They declare their approval of the President in all his efforts to prevent the United States being involved in war and their hope that such efforts may continue to be successful. They urge upon him and all representatives of the people the speedy prosecution of every measure calculated to strengthen the entire Nation to guard its own rights and the rights of humanity against any unwarranted aggression and to establish justice and peace between men and nations; and in carrying out such measures they pledge the chief executive and Congress their hearty support.

The Peterborough Cavalry, Troop A, New Hampshire National Guard, had been serving on the Mexican border during the latter part of 1916 and early 1917 (see Militia), and returned to arrive at Peterborough on March 18, 1917. Jaffrey men thus returning were Joseph D. Donahue, 1st Sergeant; Meddie J. Taylor, Sergeant; Martin J. Kidder, Corporal; John Humiston, Bugler; Roy S. Ellison, Levi Sirois, Wilfred G. Trembley, privates. While the Troop was immediately dismissed from active duty, the respite was short, as the Troop armory at Peterborough was placed under guard on April 9, while on July 25 the men were mobilized for duty at Peterborough and the following day entrained for the State Campground at Concord. Subsequently transferred to Westfield, Massachusetts, the entire First Regiment, N. H. N. G., was there merged with the Second Maine Regiment to become the 103rd Machine Gun Battalion. In the meantime some former members had been discharged while other Jaffrey men had enlisted voluntarily, so the total of those who went overseas with the Twenty-sixth (Yankee) Division was eight. (See Service Records.)

At first it was expected that enlistments would be received locally under existing New Hampshire law, under which, in April, 1917, Charles L. Rich was appointed recruiting officer, and it was ascer-

tained that 315 local men were subject to military duty. About that time, however, the national draft law was enacted, whereby every male between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-one was required to register with the local selectmen on June 5, 1917, while drafting was carried on by lot at Washington. On that date 185 were registered; one year later, June 5, 1918, sixteen additional, who had reached the age of twenty-one during the intervening year, were registered; while on September 12, 1918, an extension of registration, to include those between the ages of eighteen and forty-five, brought 269 more eligibles.

In the meantime many young men of the community were enlisting voluntarily; and during the progress of the war, from April, 1917, to November, 1918, there were forty such enlistments in the Army, and eleven in the Navy while two offered their services in the Aviation Corps. Of the forty Army enlistments, twenty-five served overseas.

Following the first draft enrollment those listed were assigned appropriate numbers and the first draft call was made in Cheshire County on July 20, 1917, the County's quota being only four because of the large number of voluntary enlistments. Among these four is found the name of Roch Chenevert, Jr., of Jaffrey. Immediately thereafter, however, a call for sixteen more from the County was made, in which list was included the name of Tracy W. Harrington; and Chenevert and Harrington were examined and accepted on the same day, August 6, 1917, being inducted a few weeks later. The total number drafted from Jaffrey was sixty-one, of whom fourteen saw overseas service.

While several of those serving on the front were wounded, only one, John Humiston, made the supreme sacrifice, being killed at Apremont, France, on June 16, 1918. Four others, Roy S. Ellison, Herman C. Charlonne, George L. Stratton, and Julius F. Seelye, succumbed to disease while in cantonments or on furlough in the United States.

The bronze tablet on the Memorial Boulder in the base of the War Memorial "Buddies" on East Jaffrey Common bears the names of one hundred and four men who served in the World War. These names were compiled in 1919 and the list was understood at that time to be complete. However, it was afterwards learned that several sons of Jaffrey had entered service at other points and their military records are included in the list which follows this chapter. The names of those thus mentioned which do not appear on the Boulder are as follows:

The men of Jaffrey acquitted themselves well in time of stress as indicated by the numerous citations mentioned in the service records. Many of them were advanced to non-commissioned officer positions while eight received commissions.

Miss Eva M. Lord, who had served the Jaffrey Nursing Association as District Nurse for some months, resigned to accept a position as Army Nurse.

While the men of Jaffrey were contributing their utmost in the various branches of active war service, those at home were also "doing their bit." A Public Safety Meeting was held in Union Hall, on May 6, 1917, at which the speakers were Reverend Herbert A. Hennon, Reverend Myron L. Cutler, and George H. Duncan, at which time all were exhorted to plant gardens in accordance with the slogan "Food Will Win the War." As a result of this agitation, Wayland H. Goodnow offered the use of land in the rear of his home on East Main Street, where more than twenty small gardens were cultivated during the two war years. The women of the community met in small groups, first to prepare bandages and other dressings and later to knit sweaters, socks, and mittens for the men in the trenches. From time to time public gatherings were held to urge the people to greater efforts in conserving various necessities and in contributing to various causes of which, unfortunately, no authentic record was preserved. But, it is safe to say that in every undertaking the community did all in its power to advance the cause in which the United States was embarked.

In the subscriptions for the issues of Liberty Bonds the citizens of the town responded liberally as is shown by the following record:

Of the First Liberty Loan it was stated in the *Monadnock Breeze* of June 23, 1917, that "74 of 100 employees of the Granite State Tack Company have subscribed \$4,650.00."

While no record was preserved of the procedure in any case except that of the Third Liberty Loan, the course at that time, as given in the *Breeze* of March 30, 1918, is typical. The full committee, in addition to the chairman, was as follows:

At noon of the opening day the bells on all the churches were rung and the whistles of industrial plants were blown for five minutes. Following this, members of the committee approached practically every person in town for subscriptions with gratifying results.

Subscriptions for all the Liberty Loans were handled through the Monadnock National Bank without charge; and the labor entailed upon the officials of this institution, Charles L. Rich, cashier, assisted by Mrs. Rich, with Miss Susan Henchman as assistant cashier, in connection with the many installment payments was tremendous but cheerfully carried through.

The sale of Thrift Stamps and War Savings Stamps up to March 15, 1919, which was practically the close of their offering, was \$14,133.91, a per capita average of \$7.46.

Several drives for funds for the support of the Red Cross, the Young Men's Christian Association and the Knights of Columbus were carried out successfully. A Red Cross Drive in June, 1917, netted \$1,344.52; another in May, 1918, exceeded the quota of \$1,500; a Y. M. C. A. drive in November, 1917, brought in \$1,425; while a campaign in behalf of all war work organizations in November, 1918, under the direction of Delcie D. Bean, chairman, exceeded a quota of \$3,032.

The three principal industries of the town all were engaged in supplying commodities for war use. The Granite State Tack Company made millions of hob nails for soldiers' shoes; White Brothers supplied denim for fatigue uniforms; while Bean & Symonds Company fabricated wooden cases for the shipment of war materials.

Although everyone did his share with enthusiasm during the strenu-

ous years of 1917-18, a deep sigh of relief swept the community in common with the rest of the country when the joyful news of the signing of the Armistice came on November 11, 1918. No more would mothers and fathers dread the announcement of the death or suffering of their dear ones "over there." No longer was there necessity of "gasoline-less Sundays," "heatless Mondays," sugarless coffee, and dark-colored bread. With gladness plans were hastily made for a suitable celebration of the day. A delegation made a speedy trip to Boston for fireworks, Hon. Charles Gale Shedd, of Keene, just returned from overseas service, was invited to be speaker and with George H. Duncan as chairman, the people gathered in Union Hall in the evening of Armistice Day to express their relief, by cheers, dancing, and good cheer, to the accompaniment of the ringing of bells and blowing of whistles, at the termination of the ordeal.
