Brian Duval - \$500

THE PERMANENT FUND of the Harvard Travellers Club is a charitable organization that was established in 1937 "to foster research and/or exploration which involves travel." It operates as a 501(c)(3) tax exempt organization meaning that contributions made to the Fund are tax deductible.

The affairs of the Fund are overseen by three Trustees, all members of the Club. Presently, these are Kenneth A. Henderson, Jesse R. Page and George P. Bates.

Typically, three or four grants are made each year to individuals. The typical grant is \$1,000. Applications for funding are made to the Trustees, who recommend awards to the Club Council for approval. The trustees and Council seek proposals that involve original research or exploration which is intimately involved with travel. Consideration is given to financial need.

At a meeting of the Council of the Harvard Travellers Club held at 154 Coolidge Hill, Cambridge, Mass., at 5.05 P.M. on March 17, 1938, at which a quorum was present, a vote was passed of which the following is a true copy:

"VOTED: To advise the Trustees of the Harvard Travellers Club Trust Fund (Messrs. F. H. Curtiss, J. K. Howard and George H. Lyon) that the Council has recommended that not more than \$100 out of income from the Fund be appropriated for the purchase and suitable marking of a good surveyor's aneroid to remain the property of the Club, and (2) that this be lent for the season of 1938 to Mr. Bradford Washburn".

Kindly advise me as soon as possible if this meets with your approval in order that I may instruct Mr. Washburn to purchase the Aneroid.

At a Council meeting on April 15, 1952, it was voted:

1. That we contribute \$125.00 from our trust funds to our member, Associate Professor Hallam L. Movius, Jr., so that the Peabody Museum of Harvard University will have a representative in Algiers at the meetings of the International Commission on Fossil Man, of which Mr. Movius is Secretary, in September, 1952. At the same time he will be the official delegate of the Peabody Museum, and probably the official U. S. delegate at the Pan-African Congress in Algiers. We are bringing this matter to the attention of our members because Mr. Movius needs about \$1,000 for this trip. We hope that some of our members might be interested in adding to the Club gift. Checks should be made out to the Peabody Museum, and mailed to the treasurer of the Harvard Travellers Club. This is a federal income tax deduction.

2. It was also voted that because of our recognition of the good work done by the American Geographical Society, Broadway at 156th Street, New York City, that we try to help them on their 100th anniversary this year by submitting to them our list of members for them to contact concerning their work if they so desire. We acknowledge their good work and we think that you will be interested in knowing more about it. We know that many of our members are already enthusiastic members of the A. G. S.





Shane J. Rosenthal

\$500.00

Rosenthal is a doctoral candidate at the University of Cambridge. His doctoral research is underway at the Cuc Phuong National Park in northern Viet Nam. His research will look at how resource availability (primarily wood, game and water) at Cuc Phuong affects local welfare and natural resource management. Hopefully this research will assist park staff in designing programs which involve communities in the protection and management of protected area resources. This applicant received a grant from the Fund last year. Normally we do not offer grants to the same person more than one time. However, we recommend an exception in this case because of the exceptional quality of his work and proposal.

Jefferson D. Davis

\$500.00

Davis obtained a Master's degree from the University of Sheffield in England late last year. The topic of his Master's Thesis was plant use by the Viking settlers in Greenland. He wants to join a research team going to Greenland this summer which is trying to determine the cause of the end of European settlements there. His part of the research will involve plant foods and an attempt to recreate the Vikings' diet. He believes the Vikings would not have been able to survive without the cultivation of garden or wild plants.

Gail E. Renehan

\$500.00

Renehan is a graduate student at the Tufts School of Veterinary Medicine. She is planning to do research at the Chimfunshi Wildlife Orphanage near Chingala, Zambia. Her interest is the use of medicinal plants by chimpanzees. Chimpanzees in the wild have been shown to preferentially select plants containing secondary, medicinal compounds in areas and during seasonal periods associated with a high risk of parasitic infection. She hopes to prove the increased health benefits from inclusion of medicinal plants in the diet of captive chimpanzees.

The Committee recommends that a grant in the amount of \$300.00 be made to Mr. David Webb. Mr. Webb is a student of anthropology in the Ph. D. program at the University of Chicago. He plans to travel to the Peruvian highlands in June of this year to study human walking among one of the machiguengo speaking peoples. In particular he is studying the natural function of the upper limbs and how they are used during locomotion. To accomplish his research he needs to study a large number of healthy, natural walkers which would be difficult at best in our industrialized society.

Mr. Webb will also be assisting others to find ways to interpret human and human-like footprints which have been found in increasing numbers at prehistoric archaeological sites.






